Dear Friends,

It is sunny and bright, but very cold. And I am reminded of how often Swedenborg talks about faith in God without love to the neighbor and compares this to light without heat. This kind of light allows us to see what we are doing, but it gives very little comfort and nothing grows and bears fruit. So it is with faith in God without love: it allows a person to comprehend and understand many things, but without love in the heart, it brings very little comfort to the person or to others and it does not foster growth or bear fruit in action. For our faith to grow and prosper and bear fruit our comprehension and understanding must be coupled with compassion and affection for others. And what is more, these two seemingly different and yet inseparable inner qualities must be joined together in action. Then information and knowledge become wisdom and caring and passion becomes love and, joined together in our actions, they become the path and the means for spiritual regeneration. The joy and celebration of the Christmas season is behind us. The celebration of Easter is ahead of us. And in this rather quiet time in the church year we have an opportunity to look inward and upward. It is a time to renew our relationship with the Lord and infuse our relationships with our family and friends and neighbors, and even the stranger we meet in passing, with the

devotion we have toward God. There is no special event, no specific reason to do anything special, and yet that is all the more reason to make an extra effort. I once heard it said, "Ethics are what you do when no one is looking." And there is a certain truth to that. For when no one is looking, the only person you are accountable to is yourself and then it is your values, your priorities, and ultimately your loves that come to the surface and are expressed. This is the time of year when there are no special reasons to motivate us. And so it is the perfect time to look inward to our relationship with the Lord. And it is the perfect time to look for ways to express the love of God in our relationships with others in the world. Because it is times like this when nothing special is happening, that it will truly come from the heart. And it is actions that come from the heart that are like the coming of spring, the sun rises early and with the light comes a warmth that brings new life.

Speaking of warmth and new life, I saw in the news today that the conservative side of Christianity has taken up the issue of global warming and our responsibility of stewards of the garden we call earth. Do we really need a special event, let alone a crisis, to take seriously our affect on the earth? Must we be forced into appreciating the world God has so generously given us and our part in caring for it? Who in



Groundhog Day Why the Groundhog?

Since a groundhog (or *woodchuck* or “whistle pig”) hibernates for the winter, its coming out of the ground is a natural sign of spring. In Europe centuries ago, people watched for other hibernating animals, including badger, bears, and hedgehogs, as signs of winter’s end. Germans who immigrated to *Pennsylvania* in the mid-1800s began keeping an eye on the groundhog. The widespread population of the rodent made it a handy agent for this particular weather superstition. And a superstition it is. But there’s a grain of truth: the winter days when you can see your shadow clearly are often especially cold, because there are no clouds overhead to insulate the earth. Why now? Early February is midway between the *winter solstice* and the *spring equinox*. Throughout history numerous holidays have marked this seasonal crossroads. Among these is *Candlemas Day*, February 2, a Christian holiday that celebrates Mary’s ritual purification. Early Christians believed that if the sun came out on *Candlemas Day*, winter would last for six weeks more. (By: Holly Hartman)

President’s Day

The original version of the holiday was in commemoration of George Washington’s birthday in 1796 (the last full year of his presidency). Washington, according to the calendar that has been used since at least the mid-18th century, was born on February 22, 1732. According to the old style calendar in use back then, however, he was born on February 11. At least in 1796, many Americans celebrated his birthday on the 22nd while others marked the occasion on the 11th instead.

By the early 19th century, Washington’s Birthday had taken firm root in the American experience as a bona fide national holiday. Its traditions included Birth night Balls in various regions, speeches and receptions given by prominent public figures, and a lot of revelry in taverns throughout the land. Then along came Abraham Lincoln, another revered president and fellow February baby (born on the 12th of the month). The first formal observance of his birthday took place in 1865, the year after his assassination, when both houses of Congress gathered for a memorial address. While Lincoln’s Birthday did not become a federal holiday like George Washington’s, it did become a legal holiday in several states.

Apparently, while the holiday in February is still officially known as Washington’s Birthday (at least according to the Office of Personnel Management), it has become popularly (and, perhaps in some cases at the state level, legally) known as “President’s Day.” This has made the third Monday in February a day for honoring both Washington and Lincoln, as well as all the other men who have served as president.
